

Andrographis

(*Andrographis paniculata*)

Product Monograph

- Traditionally used to treat upper respiratory infections such as the common cold and sinusitis, to treat influenza with fever, bronchitis and tonsillitis
- Traditionally used to improve immune function
- Traditionally used for urinary tract infections.
- Traditionally used for acute diarrhea.

With a long history of medicinal use in the Far East, andrographis is listed in the *Pharmacopoeia of the People's Republic of China*, which enumerates its traditional use indications as influenza with fever, sore throat, acute or chronic cough, colitis, dysentery, and urinary tract infection.¹

In the light of repeated clinical trials herbalist Peter Holmes summarizes that andrographis “has emerged as one of China’s foremost immune stimulating anti-infective remedies for a large variety of bacterial, viral, and parasitic infections.”²

Echoing the *Pharmacopoeia of the People's Republic of China*, the extensively referenced *WHO Monograph* on andrographis points out that the following uses of this herb are supported by clinical trials: “Prophylaxis and symptomatic treatment of upper respiratory infections, such as the common cold and uncomplicated sinusitis; bronchitis and pharyngotonsillitis; lower urinary tract infections; and acute diarrhoea.”³

Well-known herbalists Simon Mills and Kerry Bone stress the immune-enhancing properties of this valuable herb and cite a study in which it is concluded that andrographis treatment “can significantly shorten the course and duration of the common cold.”⁴

Administration:

Adults: Take 0.8-1 ml (24-30 drops) 3-4x daily in a little water on an empty stomach.

Contraindications and Cautions:

Cautions and Warnings: Consult a health care practitioner before use if you are breastfeeding or if you are taking anticoagulant, antiplatelet or hypotensive medication. Consult a health care practitioner if symptoms worsen or persist.

Contraindications: Do not use if pregnant or if you are an organ transplant recipient.
